



Brompton & Sawdon CP School Curriculum Intent Statement Why is our curriculum like it is?

We are proud of our rural heritage and surroundings, yet fully cognisant of our need to place the school and children at the centre of the global community, fully preparing them for the challenges and opportunities that this will bring. Our Curriculum covers the National Curriculum, but is heavily influenced, underpinned and extended by:

3) The need to ensure that our children fully understand the challenges and opportunities in the modern world, giving them the skills and aspiration to make a real difference. We refer to this as Rural Aspirations.



4) The need to ensure that they have a good understanding and knowledge of Global features, patterns and events




5) At all times, we aim to be inspired by nature, seizing opportunities to be inspired by nature, whatever the subject. The might be reflected through resources used, media explored, or linking learning to local and global issues regarding the environment. Opportunities are grasped to celebrate and explore nature in all its guises, from ecosystems to microhabitats, from the smallest organisms to giants of natural world - at all times looking for ways to learn from it.

Being a wild school inspires children by fostering a connection with nature, encouraging curiosity, and promoting a sense of freedom, allowing young people to learn not only through traditional methods but also from the vibrant, unpredictable classroom of the outdoors.

Personal development, giving the children the confidence, skills and knowledge to succeed in later life, ramifies through everything that we do. 
What does it mean to be 'Ready to Fly' at Brompton and Sawdon Primary School? (inspired by our amazing links to George Cayley)

Whether the children are the oldest or youngest in the class, and whatever the subject, we intend to challenge them through careful planning, questioning and collaborative work. We also look to grasp every opportunity to develop the children's Cultural Capital, allowing them to yet further explore and extend their knowledge and vocabulary.
