Curriculum Intent Statement for our Wild School







Wild School sessions provide diverse opportunities that can help learners build positive values and attitudes about themselves and about learning and the environment in which they live.





Learners are given appropriately challenging and achievable tasks that build their confidence, skills and independence and are given time to explore their thoughts, feelings and relationships. These inter and intra-personal skills directly impact on the learning of new skills. Learners have a unique perspective on their environment, giving them the knowledge and values to explore other settings with curiosity and care. We hold high expectations for our pupils with SEND, aiming to provide the necessary support, adaptations, and resources for them to achieve learning objectives alongside their peers, rather than simplifying tasks.

This might include...

- Adult support, different groupings, adapted tasks to reflect different learning styles
- Pre-teaching of specific vocabulary or concepts
- Over-teaching to reinforce / Adult support in a small group or 1:1
- 1:1 support where and when necessary
- Word mats / visual cues that explain some of the key concepts or vocabulary
- Knowledge organisers to refer back to if they are unsure of a particular concept
- Further / additional or adapted resources around the classroom
- Adapted tools / worksheets / books / timings
- Carefully considered Peer buddies / pairings / groupings
